DEFINITION/PATHOLOGY/INJURY (10)

- Pain evoked from a dorsal root or its ganglion
- Disc herniation is the most common cause
 - Inflammation of the nerve (pain)
 - Compression of the nerve
 - Associated radiculopathy
- Disc related (potentially worsens with spinal flexion/compression)
- Associated dermatomal/myotomal issues
 - Numbness/tingling
 - Weakness

PRIMARY SYMPTOMS (10)

- Pain with flexion/compression
- Neural tension-hurts to stretch the nerve
- May hurt to load the involved side
- Dermatomal/ Myotomal weakness
 - May have longer term issues associated with myotomal weakness that must be resolved
- Ex. tib anterior/quad/calf

STATS (19)

- 63-72% of patients experience paresthesia
- 35% experience radiation of pain in the lower limb
- 27% <u>numbness</u>
- 37% muscle weakness
- 40% absent ankle reflexes
- 18% absent knee reflexes
